Skills for the Classroom

Guidelines From The Department Of Education

Each school designs its own transition year programme, which provides for the development of students personal and social skills. It encourages research and activity based self-directed learning, both inside and outside the classroom. The following are just some of the associated skills that would be developed by your pupils through learning bridge:

- Improved Memory Work
- Enhanced Communication Skills
- Improved Concentration
- Reasoning

- Searching for Patterns
- Building of Personal Values
- Justification
- Challenges

- Getting on with others as a necessity
- Talking and discussing
- Deductive Reasoning
- Constructing arguments to justify reasoning

The initial proposal is to introduce bridge as part of the Transition Year Programme and expand from there as demand requests. Our initial objective is to target schools in the same region so as to facilitate the formation of school leagues.

There are two different possibilities for introducing bridge into your school. Firstly trained teachers can be provided or secondly teachers from your school can participate in one of our teacher training programmes, where full curriculum Manuals will be provided.



CBAI Teachers Manuals

The CBAI Teachers Manuals include 23 lesson plans each best suited to a double class period. The CBAI would encourage you to become a CBAI accredited teacher before beginning your school lessons though this is not required. Contact the CBAI headquarters for details of teacher training programmes.

Mini Bridge

This is a simplified version of bridge available from the CBAI headquarters. If opting solely for this simplified version, teachers must train as a director to run newcomer games during the programme.

Getting Your Class Started

1. Suitable as a social activity that requires no special or extensive equipment and can be conducted almost anywhere
2. While ideal for the transition year programme bridge is best suited to double class periods to allow for a period of instruction and a period of play

AFTER THE LESSONS

At The School

1. Help to start a school bridge club where lesson graduates can practice and new students can take lessons. Please contact your Regional Secretary for local assistance in running your club.
2. The CBAI web site www.cbai.ie links to free Learn to Play Bridge Software on the ACBL web site. Their system does vary from the basic Irish System in that it teaches a strong rather than a weak NT and 5 instead of 4 card Majors – but still a superb interactive teaching tool which is FREE
3. Introduce your bridge club to playing on line on free internet sites like www.bridgebase.com

Outside The School

1. Promote the bridge class and club to the local newspapers and radio. The media is always interested in youth
2. Recruit (with the help of your Regional Secretary), a Club Manager and organise a short game for your students weekly from 4 weeks classes onwards
3. Work with a local bridge club and get them to run an "Adopt a junior" programme to get young people playing
